
MASTER MODEL RAILROADER #130 DR. R. B. TROMBLEY

Dr. Robert B. "R. B." Tromblev, 45, is MMR #130. R. B. lives in Royal Oak, Mich., with his wife Lucille and their daughter Katie. R. B. and Lucille have been married 14 years, R. B. is president. and chief scientist of Radiation Effects Ltd. located in Royal Oak and is also a senior advisory consultant for SIRCO Enterprises, Inc. located in Troy, Mich. His radiation effects work deals primarily with the effects of radiation on space and ICBM systems, and his work with SIRCO Enterprises deals with computer systems analysis and development. R. B. has degrees in electrical engineering, law, and a PhD in astronomy. He has done post-doctorate work at UCLA. Dr. Trombley was recently honored by being inducted into the Who's Who In America Midwest Edition His nomination to Who's Who came as a result of major contributions to the national defense and development of computer software and methodology to analyze the effects of radiation on weapon and space systems.

Like many other model railroaders. R. B. started out as a youngster with a Marx train set. He didn't become a serious model railroader until 1980. R. B. is currently building his fifth layout-the first four were in N scale and this one is in HO. R. B. models predominately the southwestern U.S. desert areas. But having been inspired by Leroy Thompson (PSR AP chairman) and Bruce Metcalf, Larry Lauer, Irv Schulz, John Selkirk, and Jack Weir (a nearby neighbor), he plunged into it and kept at it.
